

Pupil Premium Impact Assessment

Last academic year the academy received £228,360 from the Pupil Premium initiative. The funding was used to support four key areas as outlined below.

Learning in the Curriculum

- Of the Year 6 cohort, 48% were on the Pupil Premium register.
- Of the Year 6 Pupil Premium cohort, 32% were on the SEND register; 64% were boys and 4% did not sit the test.
- Of the Pupil Premium boys, 63% were on the SEND register.
- 12% of the Pupil Premium children joined Montagu Academy in Year 5 or 6.

- Attendance across the school has remained at a consistent level for the past 3 years, including that of PP children.
- The slight dip in 2016/ 2017 data is partially due to the suspension of issuing Fixed Term Penalty Notices for unauthorised absences, by Doncaster Local Authority, and the increased number of absences from the EAL group.
- Breakfast club is regularly attended by up to 70 pupils, approximately 60% of these are eligible for pupil premium funding.

Behaviour

- Behaviour incidents requiring intervention have reduced dramatically across school.
- Fixed Term Exclusions have reduced dramatically over the past three years due to the effective work of the Inclusion Team.
